WHO WE ARE

Breakaway Youth is an early intervention program for disadvantaged young people, primarily 10 - 16 year olds. It builds relationships with the young people through monthly camps and activities.

Breakaway Youth aims to bring hope to these young people through providing a place to belong. We are committed to providing an environment that is full of challenges and encouragement while being Christ like in everything we do.

How We Started

Breakaway has been in operation for close to 30 years and was founded in 1989 by Merv Landy. Merv worked as a prison officer for 7 years and during this time he had many conversations with inmates, asking them about what might have stopped them from ending up in prison.

The most common answers he received were - "had someone really loved me" and "had someone taken me out of the environment I was in - like going camping." Merv then spent another 7 years working for Teen Challenge, a drug and alcohol rehabilitation program. It was here he realised, in his own words, "I was still working at the wrong end of the stick."

After some in depth research Merv was convinced that prevention and early intervention was the key - at this point Breakaway Youth was born.

The Breakaway Difference

We recognise that many young people end up in all kinds of antisocial behaviour like drugs, alcohol, early pregnancy and living on welfare, mostly because this is all they see around them. We believe this cycle can be broken and they should have the opportunity to live life to the fullest and reach their full potential.

We believe that to break this cycle you need to concentrate on the cause rather than the symptoms. Our program works through early intervention utilising small groups with volunteer leaders as role models and mentors who connect with the young people every month. This means a young person can start at 10 years of age, attend a weekend camp every month that is full of challenges, encouragement, and time with a mentor for the next 6 years. We believe this will change their lives forever.





THE WHY

The Campers

Young people are referred to Breakaway Youth by local welfare agencies within the Darebin and Whittlesea regions who work with their families, as well as schools, city councils and churches. They come to Breakaway Youth for many reasons.

These groups are normally split evenly between males and females, mix of australian born and children of migrants and asylum seekers. Many have been impacted by neglect, poverty and childhood trauma. They often show emotional and physiological behaviour based on these adverse childhood experiences.

Who Benefits?

The benefits to everyone involved in Breakaway are clear. The children who attend the program get some time away from their home environment. They learn life skills; develop self-esteem, self-worth and self-reliance; they learn from the caring and positive example of the leaders; and they have fun!

Their parents get respite throughout the year in which to take some time for themselves. Our volunteers benefit from the experience of being a mentor and making a real difference in these families' lives. Society as a whole benefits because children break away from anti-social behaviour and a welfare mentality to become independent young adults with a sense of direction and skills to do well in life

Anticipated Outcomes

The outcomes we anticipate are:

- The young people will gain a sense of belonging and have a safe space to learn who they are.
- The young people will learn life and social skills, and develop positive habits, skills and attitudes
- We build strong supportive relationships with the young people and their families
- We become a consistent longterm source of support for the young people and their families
- We become a point of contact to provide immediate assistance and resources to the young people and families in times of crises.

OUR PROGRAM

When campers start with Breakaway at the age of 10, their group begins by going on day outings over the first few months. This provides the opportunity for the campers to get to know one another as well as the volunteer leaders, and become familiar with the Breakaway program. After a few day trips the group then start going on overnight camps once a month, which becomes part of the regular routine for their time at Breakaway. We keep a set group of campers and leaders together during their time in the program because stability and consistency have proven to be beneficial for campers. They are able to build strong friendships with their fellow campers, and it also means the young people are able to build trusting relationships with the supportive adults who are assigned to their group which makes a big difference in terms of what they are able to get out of the Breakaway program.

In addition to the monthly overnight camps, after a group has been in the program for a year or two, they're invited along with the older campers on Breakaway's annual 6 day camp to Breakfast Creek. Usually by this time the campers have built strong relationships within their group with their peers as well as their leaders. They are also familiar with overnight camps, and the transition into a 6 day camp happens quite well. Going on a longer camp allows for a better opportunity for the campers to get to know each other, try new skills, open up to one another, and for real growth camp in June as an example of this to happen.

Most of our campers are with our program for 6 years, starting from when they are 10, and finishing up the program with their final camp at the age of 16, with a 17-day trip to Central Australia. As we sometimes have campers leave our program for varying reasons before the age of 16, we will fill those gaps with appropriately aged referrals on our waiting list, helping to keep our

groups to the 10-12 capacity which makes for better camps.

Once a camper's group has finished the program, they are given the opportunity to become a Junior Leader with a younger group. Those who have been a Breakaway camper often make for the best leaders, as they know exactly what it's like to be part of the program and can relate very well to new and younger campers. This also means we are able to easily keep contact with campers who have finished up with the program and can continue to be a supportive and positive influence in their lives.

Programs Leadership

After a rather chaotic year with staff on maternity leave and covering roles with casuals, this year progressively began to settle in the area of programs leadership.

Esther Atkins returned from Maternity leave as Program Leader in September. However, she left at the end of December to commence a new role alongside Matt Atkins as Leaders of Reservoir Salvation Church. Esther continues connection with Breakaway as some young people and leaders cross over between the two organisations. A memorandum of understanding was developed with the Church and Breakaway to reflect these connections. Breakaway shared space with the church at the SYG working together.

Hayley Tingwell also returned from maternity leave at the end of 2018 and took on the role of Trip Leader and Family Support Worker. Her role involved being the Trip Leader for two of our groups and also overseeing Summer Camp and School Holiday Program. In addition to the role, Hayley was also responsible for family support, offering additional support for our

young people and their families, outside of our programed activities. This added an extra day a week to her work schedule, totalling 3 days. This has allowed the ED to be able to focus more on operational and development areas.

Jaycob Wittingslow (one of our wonderful volunteers) has had the opportunity to grow his involvement and has taken on a casual position as Program Support. This role is a very hands-on and logistical position where he can prepare and pack up from programs. It's also a very diverse role so that he can learn and be involved in many areas of the organisation.

Programs have also been well supported by teams of volunteer leaders who have shown genuine commitment, by attending regularly with their group on activities and

CHAIRPERSONS REPORT

Dear Friends.

On behalf of the Breakaway Youth Board, it is my great pleasure to present this year's Annual Report. 2019 marks our 30 year anniversary, and I'm honored to update you.

Although I began as Chair in January 2019, I am not new to Breakaway. Nearly 30 years ago, I led on Breakaway day trips and assisted with administrative and fundraising tasks. Merv Landy's vision to have a lasting impact on the lives of young people by providing a program that engages them regularly on camps and outings, has not changed. Breakaway Youth remains focused on imparting hope through a sense of belonging and of being valued.

The success of the program is clear as we witness young people embrace belief in themselves and their choices, and grow into adults making decisions from a basis of being valued, supported and nurtured. Many remain in touch with Breakaway Youth well into their adult lives, and seek ways to give back to a program that meant so much to them in their developing years.

Integral in these successes is our Executive Director, Paul Coleman. His connection with Breakaway Youth Scout facility will come to an end spans our whole 30 years, as he was our very first volunteer leader. He now leads the staff and volunteers with wisdom, passion, energy and love. His discernment, guidance and commitment benefit every young person in the program. I thank Paul, on behalf of the Board, for all he brings to the role, and congratulate him on all the successes we've seen this year.

We're proud to have over 27 participants in the program, numerous volunteers and camp leaders, and a staff of 7. Primarily, the Board's focus is to ensure the direction of Breakaway Youth by providing the framework, accountability, and checks needed, and to support our Executive Director to carry out his role.

Importantly, we are developing a Governance Manual based on our fundamental values and mission. We look forward to the benefit of having this for our reference, both now and for future boards.

Our previous Chair, Bruce Tucker was employed as our Strategy Officer, and has been at the helm of drafting the Governance Manual as well as formalizing systems across our organization. Bruce has a lifetime of experience in youth work and the management of not-for-profits and charities, countless contacts in similarly focused organisations, and intimate knowledge of Breakaway Youth, our vision, and our resources. I commend Bruce's analytical and strategic skills, his attention to detail, and his diligence to follow through.

Breakaway Youth will require a new home as our time in the current when Victrack acquire it for the rail development. This facility has been a blessing for many years, offering a home to our staff, and to the young people in the program who stop in to catch up, or participate in program events. We are exploring the options for our new home which must be located within the catchment area of the youth who access the program, close to public transport, and have



facilities that will allow more efficient running of the organization, and the potential for growth. To this end, we have established a sub-committee to research and locate a new building.

Breakaway Youth programs are possible because of the wonderful generosity from our supporters and friends. We are constantly inspired by the many creative ways our friends and supporters find to raise funds for Breakaway Youth, and by the gifts we receive. We also have a number of fundraising efforts throughout the year that the young people in the program can be involved in, as well as our Annual Auction which is run by an amazing team of volunteers and achieved record breaking results in

This year we established the Finance sub-committee which is comprised of the Executive Director, Treasurer of the Board, our Strategy Officer, and our Finance Officer. This has allowed greater focus on detailed financial management, and given the Board clearer options for consideration.

We look forward to the coming year, with the changes to come, growth of our groups and programs, and our celebration of the 30th Anniversary.

DIRECTORS REPORT

It's hard to believe that the amazing vision of Breakaway Youth started thirty years ago. It's a long time ago - and at the same time it feels like we are still so young and just getting started. Looking back to the inspiring beginnings of where it all began, Breakaway was born when our founder, Merv Landy, decided to do something for young people who were growing up without hope for the future; in fact without even realising that a productive future was even an option. Now, thirty years later, we are running multiple programs every month – as part of a long term, holistic youth support program that is like no other.

As I was driving the bus on a program recently, I turned to a camper sitting close by and asked, "So, Tanya, with your group graduating from the Breakaway program at the end of this year, what are you planning on doing after you finish?" She turned to me – with the biggest grin ever – and replied, "Are you kidding me?! Only what I have always wanted to do – become a leader, of course, and give the little kids the opportunities I've had!"

With thirty years under our belt, we are well experienced in running programs and events, and this year we have continued as usual – but in addition we have included a new focus. We have started working strategically towards growing stronger and more sustainable, by taking time to document what we do and how we do it; reviewing and writing policies for all areas.

People are the first and foremost focus of Breakaway Youth, and so

it should be no surprise that the organisation is run by an amazing and talented team of - yes! people. As part of our focus for strengthening the organisation, we have identified areas where too few people have been attempting to meet multiple and varied needs which don't necessarily match their skillset. We have addressed this by sharing the workload across an increased number of people, each of whom is now focusing on key areas that match their skills. For example: a Trip Leader focused on running programs and supporting campers; an Administration Officer working solely on administration; a dedicated Grant Writer who enjoys writing grants; a Strategic Officer who can focus purely on policies and organisational documentation. These are all small, part-time positions – but very effective and productive when filled with skilled, dedicated people who can focus on what they are good at and don't have to attempt to juggle multiple roles.

Our volunteers continue to be the lifeblood of the organisation, covering many areas across what we do: camp leaders, fundraising, developing our property and assets, camp cooks, office administration - and we simply could not operate without them. A special acknowledgement needs to go out to our annual fundraising auction; specifically the team that organised the event; also the donors and the attendees. The funds raised this year reached a new record. If you have never been to a Breakaway Auction then you are really missing an amazing event!

There is another team of dedicated people that can often go unnoticed – and they are of course the Board. This team provides good solid governance, observing what we do within Breakaway Youth – with the vision to do it better. The Board have been a fantastic support to me, while still pushing and stretching my capabilities as a Director.

As a not-for-profit entity, it is fantastic that Breakaway Youth can partner with generous individual donors, trusts, foundations and other philanthropic organisations. It's our privilege to have been supported by so many this year. The generosity of our supporters has been tremendously encouraging and I would like to thank everyone who has been able to partner with us this year.



SUMMER CAMP

The Breakaway Summer Camp is based at Breakaway's Glendale property, with adventures out to Eildon and Marysville. The camp involves a week of challenges, team building activities, fun, laughter, and group bonding. The program helps build a strong and deep experience of both connection and contribution in our campers. Activities and experiences include the development of both skills to hear and the Breakaway leaders and attitudes for each participant through a series of well designed tasks and opportunities.

One of the most popular activities is our massive waterslide. Many campsites have waterslides or go to waterparks to give the participants a fun and joy filled day. However at Breakaway we do things a little differently. Our young people are challenged with the task of designing and building their own waterslide together. This is a really rewarding



experience as they not only get to enjoy the fruits of their labour as a whole group, they also gain invaluable skills in team building, others to a successful and shared

At Summer Camp every person receives an Encouragement Award for something they have done, achieved, or demonstrated. The categories for encouragement awards are always personal and reinforce the principle that everyone has something to offer and everyone is seen and valued. This is an essential message that we all need are committed to ensuring that every young person knows something of their inherent worth. To experience others appreciation of your efforts and encouragement of your contribution is a beautiful gift.

Another important aspect of the Summer Camp is group time. These times give our campers the opportunity to bond, listen better and be heard and valued by not only other campers but by our leaders. We want to honour and thank each of our amazing leaders who are positive role models in our young people's lives. The leaders actions are far more powerful than their words and the Breakaway team are truly incredible!

Summer camp provides the opportunity to not only hear, but to see love and positivity in action. The culture of Breakaway and the values we hold are communicated in our actions as well as our words. 

FINANCIAL STATEMENT NOTES

Note 1:

The financial report has been prepared on a cash basis and is based on historic costs and does not take into account changing money values or, except where specifically stated, current valuations of non-current assets.

a. Income Tax.

The association is exempt from income tax as a charity and acordingly no income tax has been provided for.

b. Inventory.

Breakaway Camps Inc. carries no stock.

. Property, Plant and Equipment.

Equipment is carried at cost or fair value less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. The depreciable amount of fixed assets is depreciated over their useful lives to the association commencing at the time the asset is held ready for use. Items that are fully depreciated have been written back to zero value and zero depreciation.

Property is not depreciated but held at cost

Equipment and vehicles are depreciated at a rate between 20% - 34%.

d. Employee Entitlements and Labour Costs.

The association provides for Long Service Leave and Annual Leave on an accrual basis. Provision is made for Long Service Leave after 7 years of continuous service. Labour costs also include payments for superannuation guarantee contributions, benefits to employees and staff training.

e. Revenue.

Income from donations is recognised on receipt. Recurrent monthly donations are summed up at the end of financial year from accounting software and tax deductibility receipt sent to the donor.

Revenue from the rendering of a service is recognised upon the receipt of payment from the customers. Invoices are sent to customers and, where appropriate GST is invoiced and paid to the Australian Tax Office.

Note 2:

Grants are included as income in the financial year they are spent. All unexpended monies are recorded as 'Unexpended grants' and the cumulative funds are carried forward in the Balance Sheet as a Liability under the title of the specific grant.

All grant monies were donated to enable camps to be run by Breakaway Youth in its outdoor adventure program as well as other programs such as the School Holiday Program.

FOUNDATION STONES FOR THE FUTURE

The Board identified in 2018 that to prepare for the future potential for growth and expansion of Breakaway Youth, it needed to ensure its foundations were solid.

One part of this, meant a total review and development of all the policies and procedures of the organisation to ensure they provided a solid platform for the future and reflected current best practice.

Across the years Breakaway has had a clear focus on its work with young people - policies and procedures have grown up around this work in a very hodgepodge manner, and in need of structure and consistency.

The Board knew the importance of this development but understood how challenging and time consuming this would be. After a unanimous decision, it was recognised that this person must have both knowledge of the organisation and have the required skillset for this mammoth undertaking.

Therefore, Bruce Tucker who had been part of the Board for the last six years, and who had a long history in Youth Services Management, was asked to step off the board to take up this position. After considering this proposal Bruce accepted and was appointed by the board to do this review and redevelopment as the Strategy Officer on a project agreement.



Additionally, Bruce worked with the Executive Director in putting in place an Operational Plan for financial
