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WHO WE ARE

Breakaway Youth is an early intervention program for disadvantaged young people, generally 10 to 16 years old, which brings hope by providing them with a place to **belong**.

Breakaway Youth builds relationships with these young people in the context of monthly camps and activities. We are committed to being Christ-like in everything we do and dedicate ourselves to fostering an environment that is full of both challenge and encouragement.

How We Started

Breakaway Youth has been in operation for over 30 years, and was founded in 1989 by Merv Landy. Previously, Merv had worked as a prison officer for 7 years. During that time he had many conversations with inmates, asking them what they thought might have stopped them from ending up in prison.

The most common answers he received were - "had someone really loved me" and "had someone taken me out of the environment I was in - like going camping." Following this, Merv invested 7 years working for a drug and alcohol rehabilitation program,

and it was here that he came to the realisation that, in his own words, he was "still working at the wrong end of the stick".

After some in-depth research Merv became convinced that early intervention was the key to prevention - and at this point Breakaway Youth was born.

The Breakaway Difference

Breakaway Youth believes that generational cycles of substance abuse, incarceration, family violence and welfare dependency can be broken. Every young person should have the opportunity to reach their full potential, however, being immersed in environments characterised by antisocial behaviour provides them with no positive alternative.

Through early intervention our program works to provide young people with a different narrative. Structured small groups with volunteer leaders act as positive role models and mentors, connecting with the same group of young people every month. Beginning at the age of 10, a young person can attend a monthly weekend camp for the next six years; an experience that changes their life forever.

WHAT WE DO

When young people start with Breakaway at the age of 10, their group begins by going on day outings over the first few months. This provides the opportunity for young people to get to know one another, their volunteer leaders, and become familiar with the Breakaway program. After a few day trips the group then starts doing overnight camps once a month, which become part of the regular routine for their time at Breakaway. We keep the same group of young people and leaders together during their time in the program, because stability and consistency have proven to be beneficial for young people. The young people are able to build strong friendships with other campers in their group, and also able to build trusting relationships with the supportive adults who are assigned to their group. This makes a big difference in terms of what they are able to get out of the Breakaway program.

In addition to monthly overnight camps, after a group has been in the program for a year or two, they're invited along with the older young people on Breakaway's annual 6 day camp to Breakfast Creek. By this time, young people have usually built strong relationships within their group, with their peers as well as their leaders. They are also familiar with overnight camps, and the transition into a 6 day camp happens quite well. Going on a longer camp allows for better opportunities for the young people to get to know each other, try new skills, open up to one another, and for real growth to happen.

Most of our young people participate in our program for 6 years, starting from when they are 10 years old, and finishing up the program with their final camp at the age of 16, a 17-day trip to Central Australia. As we sometimes have young people leave our program



for varying reasons before the age of 16, we will fill those gaps with appropriately aged referrals on our waiting list, helping to keep our groups at the 10-12 capacity which makes for better camps.

Once a young person's group has finished the program, they are given the opportunity to become Junior Leaders with a younger group. Those who have been a Breakaway young person often make the best leaders, as they know exactly what it's like to be part of the program and can relate very well to new and younger participants. This also means we are able to easily keep contact with young people who have finished up with the program and can continue to be a supportive and positive influence in their lives.

VISION

HOPE FOR LIFE

Breakaway Youth offers young people hope by demonstrating that there are more positive ways to live and be.



MISSION

Breakaway Youth seeks to provide an outstanding program of intervention and challenge, bringing hope and opportunity to disadvantaged young people in Melbourne, Victoria and across Australia.

- To build long-term, consistent relationships with young people that provide care, trust and respect.
- To actively care for and guide young people through the transition from being a teen to a young adult, through creating spaces for them to

belong.

- To use adventure-based activities and intentional learning spaces to build confident, skilled and resilient young people who can cope with the challenges of life.
- To operate safely and effectively, promoting the well-being of each young person and their families/ carers.
- To encourage and support young people to be able to make critical life choices that will assist them in becoming responsible contributing

citizens who are positively engaged in life and their community.

- To endeavour to be Christ-like in all we do, putting love into action through our words and behaviour.
- To explore replicating the program into new locations, with new teams of permanent and volunteer staff.

VALUES


We value the fundamental right of every young person to grow up being loved and cared for by a responsible adult and we value the positive relationship between a significant adult mentor and a young person.

DIRECTORS'S REPORT

As much as I would like to get through this report without mentioning Covid, it's simply not going to happen. As this pandemic rolls on for the second year it seems to dominate many conversations, daily workflows and strategic planning meetings to the point where it's getting a bit long in the tooth - but all that put aside, it has presented us with some fantastic opportunities to explore.

We spent a very large portion of this year in lockdown or with restrictions that prevented us from running our usual programs. But this didn't extinguish our enthusiasm - in fact it was quite the opposite, the difficulties actually fired us up - and I'm proud of what we have been able to achieve this vear.

I'm proud of how creative we became in finding alternative ways to run our programs. Last year we had already prepared and delivered several rounds of Care Packs, and so to keep this year's Care Packs fresh and exciting, our team of volunteer Leaders continued to come up with new and different ideas for each pack's contents. However, the care went well beyond the Care Packs, as we found many different ways to connect with and support the young people, that in turn extended into support for their entire families. It has been an amazing time. Our volunteer leaders have really stepped up and made the most of these new opportunities; organising plenty of Zoom planning meetings and background preparations. I'm sure they are proud of what they have achieved.

I'm proud of how fast we adapted to the changing climate. As soon as restrictions lowered we were back on camps and programs, making the most of those weeks when we were able to gather together. It was a real breath of fresh air to run our big "Summer Camp" in the gaps between lockdowns. We recognised how important the camps were for bolstering the young people's coping skills for getting through the lockdowns. One of my favorite sayings is, "It's amazing what you can put up with, if you can just get a small break from it." I feel it has been so true this year.

I'm also proud of our board this year. Trying to achieve consistency and forward planning for the organisation has been a solid challenge, and despite losing a valued member of the team, they have stayed the course and done an excellent job. As a director I have had to chop, change and pivot many times and the board have been a tremendous support and grounding for me.

I know many not-for-profits have really struggled during this year. I'm both proud and incredibly grateful for all the people, groups, trusts and organisations that have continued to support us throughout this year. Our group of personal supporters has grown substantially this year and I find this personally very encouraging. I would like to highlight that a number of grants we received this year had to be spent in a somewhat different way than originally intended, due to the changing climate we are in. The

trusts and foundations involved have been very gracious and understanding in allowing us to adapt some of the programs, thus allowing us to be creative and seize new opportunities. Our Auction team had to switch from a large public event - as it has been for the last 25 years - into an online one. This was so different it was like planning it for the first time, but they pushed through and landed a very successful fundraising event.


It never ceases to amaze me how so many people, all doing their unique bit, can come together to produce a fully functioning, strong and adaptive organisation like Breakaway.



Why do you stay?




ANNUAL FUNDRAISING AUCTION

This year we raised over \$50,000 greatly exceeding our hopes considering the difficult financial climate so many have experienced. We are very thankful for the incredible generosity of our community amid the challenging times of isolation, lockdown and the significant disconnect so many people have experienced. We say a big "Thank You!" to everyone who donated goods and services... without you this simply could not work. A huge round of applause to the community that gathered on zoom and gave so generously for the sake of our campers.











SUMMER CAMP

It was a brilliant start of the year to be able to deliver on our annual Summer Camp. After what seemed an eternity of being unable to have any camps the restrictions lifted and we were off and running! The summer camp was our first 5-day camp in a year and we savoured every moment. All the groups came together and reunited amid a pretty relaxed schedule. The campers were keen to simply listen to each other and hang out together so our program was designed with a lot of space around it. This gave us ample time to reconnect and bond over activities, food and lots of fun together.

This summer camp was something special and fulfilled our desire to connect and build strong relationships. There were many choices available for things to do, but the campers simply wanted to hang out in the bush and enjoy the space and time on camp. It was so good to just be together again after such a challenging and difficult year.













COVID UPDATE

Covid restrictions, outbreaks, and lockdowns have presented challenges for all of us this year. It's been a tough one for all young people and our campers are no exception. With schools being closed, absence of friends, home stresses for families, and the loss of many supports and options our campers have endured much.

Our name says it all doesn't it? We offer "breaks away" from the stresses of life. The change of scenery, people, and pace gives our campers time out to refuel, have fun, discover new friendships, and reinforce old ones. We offer the opportunity and space to enjoy nature and each other's company.

This year has been difficult, however our staff and volunteers have been incredibly creative and have offered a few "at home" alternatives. We have delivered over 50 care packs this year.

We have delivered trampolines to help burn off some pent-up energy as well as doing home maintenance when needed. We have also been able to develop a Special Requests Program, which has included delivering art supplies to our emerging painters, and cooking supplies to emerging chefs!

One of our core values is that "no one misses out", that is to say if we can't all do it together we can't do it. A number of our campers do not have the technology to participate online and to ensure they did not miss out we stopped doing Zoom catch ups. This decision meant we had to be more creative than ever in keeping connection and communication up with our campers. We thank our team of incredible volunteers who have been so generous with their time and skills to ensure the at home programs were successfully delivered.

Looking forward to the end of 2021 and the easing of restrictions we hope to extend the camping program for our groups and plan additional camps to make up for time lost.

SCHOOL HOLIDAY PROGRAM

The school holiday programs took on a new shape this year to ensure they were in line with Victorian Government's Covid safe plans. One of our young leaders facilitated an Arts Day at the Breakaway Hall in Preston. The campers were consulted first about what they would like to do, and our program was designed in response to their feedback.

Taylah, designed and delivered a wonderful arts program, that included pouring paint onto a canvas. She realized that the campers may not have the skills, experience or confidence to participate in a traditional painting workshop and it might exclude some people.

By choosing to Paint Pour onto canvas and experimenting with the end result the program was far more inclusive and gave a sense of creating a masterpiece without quite knowing where it would go. Taylor commented, "I was so proud of the campers, and noticed that each canvas was completely different, representing each



individual person. Everyone had so much fun doing it."

She also offered her personal reflection, "I'm in my second year of being an emerging leader for Breakaway, and was a camper for 4 years. Having the confidence of leading at camps made me feel less pressured and so much more positive. I really enjoyed teaching the campers different ways to create a canvas painting, and they turned out amazing!"





PLANNING FOR CENTRAL CAMP

At the end of 2021 our Alpha group should be graduating from Breakaway. For most groups their Breakaway journey culminates with a 'once in a lifetime' trip to Central Australia- an epic adventure that involves an immense amount of planning, preparation and volunteer hours. However, the ever-changing COVID-19 restrictions in Victoria have made planning for this trip very complex and as at June, it is still unknown whether borders will even be open by September to enable us to go.

The incredibly tough restrictions in Victoria during 2020-2021 have meant that many Alpha camps had to be cancelled or drastically scaled down. Continuing close relationships between campers and between leaders has been especially difficult when many opportunities to connect have had to be moved online, so the usual planning process for Central has been significantly disrupted.



Equipping our campers to budget for their trip and gain employment skills to raise funds for their spending money is normally an important part of the experience leading up to Central. However, many opportunities to work odd jobs or save cash campers would normally utilise have been impossible with COVID-19 restrictions. We want the Alpha's to be well prepared to enjoy this experience and to have the opportunity to gain all of the skills they will develop in the planning process including confidence, work experience, budgeting, good communication and loaistics.

At this stage we are still hoping to go ahead and travel in September 2021, but staff and volunteers have planned a contingency that will see our Alpha's have their time with Breakaway extended and their graduating Central Australia Trip happen in the 2022 April school holidays instead.

After months of careful planning, a much needed, brand new camper trailer will start the construction process in June. This trailer is critical to the Central Trip being possible and will not only carry all of our tents, bikes and gear, but also act as the camp kitchen and carry all our water and food. We've been phenomenally encouraged by the major donations of an awning and a gas hot water system for this new camping trailer set up. We can't wait for restrictions to lift so we can take the new trailer on the road and give the Alpha Group the graduation trip of a lifetime!





FUNDING

Because the young people that come into Breakaway generally come from financially disadvantaged situations, Breakaway programs are provided at no cost to the families or guardians of our young people.



FINANCIAL STATEMENT NOTES

Note 1:

The financial report has been prepared on an accrual basis and is based on historic costs and does not take into account changing money values or, except where specifically stated, current valuations of non-current assets.

Income Tax **a**_

The association is exempt from income tax as a charity and accordingly no income tax has been provided for.

b. Inventory

Breakaway Camps Inc. carries no stock.

Property, Plant and Equipment C.

Equipment is carried at cost or fair value less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. The depreciable amount of fixed assets is depreciated over their useful lives to the association commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use. Items that are fully depreciated have been written back to zero value and zero depreciation.

Property is not depreciated but held at cost

Equipment and vehicles are depreciated at a rate between 20%-34%.

Employee Entitlements and Labour Costs d.

The Association provides for Long Service Leave and Annual Leave on an accrual basis. Provision is made for Long Service Leave after 7 years of continuous service. Labour costs also include payments for superannuation guarantee contributions, benefits to employees and staff training. No accrual is made for personal carers leave.

Revenue P-

Income from donations is recognized on receipt. Recurrent monthly donations are summed at the end of financial year from accounting software and tax deductibility receipt sent to the donor.

Revenue from the rendering of a service is recognized upon the receipt of payment from the customers. Invoices are sent to customers and, where appropriate, GST is invoiced and paid to Australian Tax Office.

Revenue has been received this financial year from July 2020 to December 2020 from the Government JobKeeper Scheme for not-for-profits impacted by the corona virus.

Note 2:

Grants are included as income in the financial year they are spent. All unexpended monies are recorded as "Unexpended grants" and the cumulative funds are carried forward in the Balance Sheet as a Liability under the title of the specific grant.

All grant monies were donated to enable camps to be run by Breakaway Youth in its outdoor adventure program as well as other programs such as the School Holiday Program, Care Boxes and Family Support.
